#### Challenging times

It has been a tumultuous few months here in north-east Victoria, as it has for many parts of Australia this year. We were lucky that Yackandandah and nearby towns were not directly affected by the bushfires, but many in our region were and the recovery efforts will take months and years to play out.

Members of TRY have been volunteering in some of the bushfire areas, passing on their experiences with resilient power systems that can give communities a little more independence and aid quick recovery in times of disaster. As we work towards making Yack 100% renewable by 2022 and giving our own community assets resilient power systems, we hope that our experiences will help others too.

We were thrilled to be able to present our efforts to them and believe that they took away some important points to add to future government initiatives.

As we navigate the strange landscape of corona virus restrictions and social distancing, the Indigo Power Community Energy Roadshow has been converted to online webinars for the moment until we can gather in large groups once again. But Yackandandah has hit the 2 GW energy generation milestone last month and is about to hit the 100 customer mark with Indigo Power. So there is every sign that our small community will power through these challenges and forge its own path.

# Indigo Power roadshow update

What a momentous summer we're having. Due to first the bushfires and now the corona virus outbreak, the Community Energy Hub Roadshow was first delayed and has now been converted to webinar events for the immediate future.

Last weeks launch in the King Valley on March 12 went ahead as planned, and the







Yackandandah Investor launch proceeded in a highly modified format on March 16.

TRY and Indigo Power hosted the Yackandandah Investor launch (following on from the Community Energy Hub launch last November), with a shortened format with no supper, to minimise time and contact between participants. A dedicated 35 people turned out to find out more about buying shares in our home grown energy retailer.

However, with the ongoing escalation of measures to prevent corona virus spread, it was clear that we needed to cancel the public version of the Roadshow. This is obviously disappointing, and puts pressure on our plans, but we know communities in our region will be ready to support projects that create local benefit once the recovery begins.

purchase of \$100. The low minimum amount means that you don't need a big income to participate. It is hoped to reach 300 expressions of interest before the offer closes by the Easter long weekend.

In another milestone, Yackandandah is **Indigo Power** approaching the magical number of 100 residents that have signed up as customers for Indigo Power!

This gave the opportunity to draw together Yackandandah groups that are focusing on creating a healthier environment. This included Arts Yackandandah, the Folk Festival, Plastic





Wise Yackandandah, Yack Community Centre and the Indigo Shire Council.

After we told the story of TRY in the gallery of the Yackandandah Public Hall, we visited buildings in the main street to show some of the simple yet profound change underway: bubblers in the main street, the museum, YCC, supermarket and the CFA.

Arriving back at the hall, Plastic Wise and Indigo Power offered an inspiring insight to their effort to tread more softly. Thanks to all involved! It's so good the Victorian Government are examining how communities are already working hard to reinvigorate local community and reduce emissions.

### Solar Homes program

Have you been thinking about your next steps in renewable energy and the inevitable shift to clean energy and storage?

In particular for Victorians, now is a great time to look closely at the rebates available. The Victorian Solar Homes program is offering strong rebates for eligible residential properties and awesome battery subsidies for people with 5 kW solar systems in eligible postcodes.

Access to the program does require that your combined household income is under \$180,000 and that the property is worth less than \$3M. For more information please refer to the link below.


#### Try TRY!
